Chapter 1 Introduction

1.1 Description

GPRS: General Packet Radio Service.

This is a radio interface designed for data transmission, using packet switching, taking advantage of the existing GSM infrastructure with new nodes.


The use of packet switching permits flexible reservation of two radio channels, depending on the requirements and the number of users. Each data packet is independently dealt with and each network elements knows how to handle each packet.

GPRS transmission is oriented to data burst transmission (periods of data with periods of inactivity). This makes better use of the radio bandwidth, which is shared with the rest of the users.

GPRS provides a permanent data carrier service between an MS (mobile station) and another terminal, connected to a GPRS network or an external data transmission network (PDN). The user perceives an IP network from his/her terminal.

A further characteristic is billing by data volume.

The GPRS system architecture is as follows:

The network elements are:

MS:	Mobile System. This is composed of:
TE:	Terminal Equipment, in our device this is the router.
ME:	Mobile Equipment, in our device this is the GPRS module installed in its interior.
	Internal communication between these two elements is carried out through AT commands during idle time and connection and through PPP protocol for data transfer.
BTS:	Base Transceiver System . Provides the physical layer link.
BSC:	Base Station Controller.
PCU:	Packet Control Unit. Element that sends and deals with the data packets towards the GPRS net- work.
BSS:	Base Station System. Group made up of the previous three elements.
HLR:	Home Location Register. GPRS network node where the subscription data is permanently stored.
	Location information at the GPRS user SGSN layer.

User Status. Subscription information (quality, fixed IP addresses, subscription permissions etc). SGSN: Serving GPRS Support. Node. Entity responsible for communication (data packet routing and transmission) between the GPRS network and the GPRS users within the service area. Provides security in the radio access (encryption and authentication). This handles the mobility management (communication with the GSM network nodes). GGSN: GGSN: Gateway GPRS Support Node. This is the GPRS network gateway towards other external networks (IP or X.25). It is capable of translating packets received from the SGSN to the external network format. In the same way, this handles the translation of IP addresses into the mobile address destination. Provides dynamic assignment of IP addresses and carries out security functions towards the external networks.

1.2 Broadband and Throughput

The broadband available in GPRS depends on various factors.

Firstly, it depends on the encoding used in the radio interface. The ETSI defines four encoding levels, (CS - **Coding Scheme**), from CS1 (better protection against errors, lower speed) to CS4 (lower protection against errors, higher speed). CS-2 is normally used in the network.

The second part depends on the number of slots used in both transmission directions (reception – Downlink, transmission – Uplink). The timeslots are dynamically assigned and depend on availability.

The following table shows the maximum theoretical broadband (in Kbps), depending on the timeslots and the used encoding scheme.

	CS-1	CS-2	CS-3	CS-4
1 TimeSlot	9.05	13.4	15.6	21.4
2 TimeSlot	18.01	26.8	31.2	42.8
3 TimeSlot	27.15	40.2	46.8	64.2
4 TimeSlot	36.2	53.6	62.4	85.6

The modules used in the Teldat devices are known as Class 8, i.e. use up to four timeslots Downstream and 1 Upstream, the theoretical limit in this case would be with a CS-2 encoding at 13.4 Kbps for transmission and 53.6 Kbps for reception.

The user will always perceive a lower speed. This is due to the Overhead introduced by the various protocols participating in the data transmission.

GPRS is an extension of GSM and uses the same frequencies, transport protocols and the same cells as GSM; consequently the GPRS encoding schemes must fulfill the same requirements as GSM. As a result, the data must be encapsulated in "GPRS Radio Blocks" of 456 bits, the same as GSM. You must include the protocol overheads within these bits (RLC, TCP/IP, etc.).

An initial estimation, due to RLC (Radio Link Control). The speed for each used timeslot, depending on the encoding scheme looks like this:

	CS-1	CS-2	CS-3	CS-4
RLC Data Unit (bits)	160	240	288	400
RLC Overhead (bits)	21	28	24	28
Total (bits)	181	268	312	428

Each block (**Radio Block**) is sent in four bursts, in the same way as GSM. It's the BSC PCU (**Packet Control Unit**) that decides to send this either via the GSM network (voice call) or over the GPRS to SGSN (GPRS packets).

The third implicated factor is the type of data itself used by the user.

Supposing that the user sends 1000 http or FTP bytes. There are various intermediate protocols that add to the overhead before sending the data to the radio link. In cases of a TCP/IP over PPP transmission, the overhead, in bytes, could be:

	Overhead

IP	20
SNDCP	4
LLC Total	7

This means that for each 1000 bytes, 1055 must to go in each RLC packet. This determines how many Radio Blocks are necessary.

Assuming a CS2 encoding, the speed for the entire RLC block (268 bits) is 12.4 Kbps.

Of these 268 block bits, 240 are RLC **Data Unit**, which are transmitted at an effective rate of 12.0 Kbps. A formula to calculate the average speed of the user data, for a timeslot is as follows:

R (Kbps) = D (bytes) x E (Kbps) / N / P (bytes)

Where:

- D # Quantity of data to be sent.
- N # Number of Radio Blocks (N = D + O / P, rounding up to the nearest whole number).
- O # Overhead of the protocols (in this case 55).
- E # Effective speed for the used encoding scheme.
- P # Maximum payload.

Chapter 2 Configuration

2.1 Introduction

The GPRS interface control is carried out through a set of **AT** commands internally generated by the device and cannot be modified by the user. The only ones the user may modify are the PIN value (**Personal Identification Number**).

The rest of the particular connection parameters are programmed in the dial and PPP protocol profiles

Before carrying out configuration, you need to know the data provided by the carrier to configure the connection. The following table provides an example of VPN access from a fictitious carrier. Please remember that both lower and upper case letters are sensitive i.e. they must be written as given.

	VPN
APN	apnname
PDP-Type	IP
Login	OPERADOR_LOGIN
Password	OPERADOR_PASS

Another piece of data that we must bear in mind is that if you require a permanent connection (from device startup), idle-time = 0, or on demand with a determined release time, idle-time = x.

Additionally we need to know the SIM PIN value going to be used. For those cases where the SIM is not blocked (i.e. PIN is not required), you do not need to configure it.

The steps needed to fully configure a connection will be shown further on in this manual.

2.2 DIAL Connection Profile

The following values can be programmed:

remote-address:

The remote-address value is always the same (*99***1#) and is the number providing access to the GPRS network. In cases where the connection is GPRS (i.e. with an APN configured), you do not need to program this value. Should the connection be CSD (**Circuit-Switched-Data**) then this value must be programmed.

3gpp-apn:

This is the GPRS node through which the connection is carried out. This value depends on the carrier.

3gpp-pdp-type:

Programs the type of Protocol Data Packet to be used in the connection. This depends on the service provided by the carrier. Normally this is the IP which co-incides with the default value.

3gpp-accessibility-control:

Permits you to enable connectivity control over the profile. This also permits different accessibility controls for different profiles. This is explained in more detail further on in this manual.

3gpp-bearer-service:

Permits programs for CSD connections (i.e. connections for a number, not connections for an APN) to have a series of characteristics, allowing you to program type of norm, speed, etc., provided the inserted module supports this. This is explained in more detail further on in this manual.

idle-time:

Indicates the time period where disconnection is carried out due to absence of

data.

A 0 idle time value means the device will immediately execute the GPRS connection. Any other value programs the disconnection without data period.

2.2.1 3GPP-ACCESSIBILITY-CONTROL

One of the drawbacks to GPRS connections is verifying GPRS availability.

As already mentioned, the mechanism the PPP protocol has for point-to-point connection control (Echo-request/Echo-reply) is ineffective in these connections as it is only significant at a "local" level i.e. between the router and the connected module.

Various mechanisms have been implemented to verify the connection status. These can be grouped into two types, intrusive (originating data traffic on line and therefore billable) and non-intrusive (does not originate data traffic).

Each of the described mechanisms can be independently configured over each profile configured in the interface.

Intrusive

2.2.1.1 3GPP-ACCESSIBILITY-CONTROL PING

Once the GPRS connection has been established, pings are sent every so many seconds, indicated in the command, to the configured IP address.

If this times out without having received a response from the remote, a second ping is sent and a response is expected within 10 seconds. If no response is received, two more pings are sent every 5 seconds. If no response is received, the device disconnects.

The command is: 3gpp-accessibility-control ping <A.B.C.D> <timer>

<A.B.C.D>: IP Address where the pings are sent.

<timer>: Time between pings.

Example:

2.2.1.2 3GPP-ACCESSIBILITY-CONTROL TRACE

Identical to the above, but this sends an ICMP trace route.

<timer>: Time between them.

2.2.1.3 3GPP-ACCESSIBILITY-CONTROL TIMER

Independently to the idle-time value configured in the connection profile, disconnection is carried out when the configured timer value times out.

The command is: 3gpp-accessibility-control timer <value>

<value>: Timer value between 60 and 86399 seconds.

Example:

2.2.1.4 3GPP ACCESSIBILITY-CONTROL TRAFFIC

This consists of monitoring the data flow in both directions at the IP layer, TCP or any.

The mechanism initiates from the fact that when there is outgoing traffic, there will always be incoming. A counter for sent frames starts (depending on the type). This value resets each time there are incoming frames, independently of the type.

The command is: 3gpp-accessibility-control traffic <counter> <type>

<counter>: represents the limit for the outgoing packets (sent to the network) for the type configured without receiving incoming packets. Once this value has been reached, the link disconnection process activates in order to try a new connection.

<type>: Type of monitored outgoing traffic.

IP: All IP traffic (TCP, UDP, etc).

TCP: Only considers TCP traffic for connection control.

ALL: Considers all traffic including non-IP traffic.

Example:

2.2.1.5 3GPP-ACCESSIBILITY-CONTROL RX-TIMER

This consists of monitoring the incoming data flow and permits a maximum time without receiving data. Once this time without receiving data has timed out, the router assumes the connection is down.

This type of monitoring is useful in scenarios where an incoming data flow is always maintained. Depending on the type of application you will need to adjust the programmed time value.

The command is 3gpp-accessibility-control rx-timer <time>

<ti>time>: This parameter indicates the period of time the router can remain without receiving incoming data in order not to start the disconnection process. Once this has timed out, the link disconnection process is activated in order to try a new connection. This can take values between 1 and 86399.

Example:

Dial Profiles config>profile X 3gpp-accessibility-control rx_timer 120 Dial Profiles config>

2.2.2 3GPP-BEARER-SERVICE-TYPE

The following commands appear in this profile:

These commands allow CSD calls (i.e. those for a number, not those for an APN) to take a series of characteristics.

You can for example, and if the module supports this, execute calls to ISDN destination numbers (numbers which indicate V.110 in speed), etc.

Values that appear as value are those defined by the 3GPP TS 27.007 for CSD calls norm.

Not all the values are possible; this depends on the module and the network. If this is incorrectly programmed, the module will return an error but will try and execute the call anyway. You need to be very careful when using this command.

The following command will appear before making an ATDXXXXXXX call when the events are enabled:

AT+CBST=speed,name,ce

Default is 0,0,1 --> Automode.

To find out the values which permit a determined module or card, enter the commands mode, as explained in the section on monitoring, and enter **AT+CBST=?**.

The MC45 and MC75 modules support the following values:

2.3.2 PPP Connection Profile

Here we must indicate that the PPP interface must use the GPRS interface as the base interface (*base-interface gprs0/0 link* command) and use the GPRS profile for dialing (*base-interface gprs0/0 profile GPRS* command).

Similarly, program the appropriate parameters for the protocol.

The user and password sent during authentication must be appropriate for the carrier and the service being used to connect (*authentication sent-user XXXXX password YYYYY* command). These are simply examples.

The IP address is normally assigned during the negotiation phase (*ipcp local address assigned* command).

Echo functionality is not required (*Icp echo-req off* command). The PPP is only significant locally, i.e. between the router and the connected GPRS module. The echo DOES NOT detect link drops nor loss of signal.

Similarly, the extreme remote IP address that appears during negotiation is the module internal IP address, which again makes no sense to have in the routing table. This can be ignored by using the *no ipcp peer-route* command.

2.4.3 ALWAYS-ATTACHED

When configured internally the modules normally execute an Attach in the network.

The **attach** process is a mechanism through which the module registers in the data network and reports it is available. We should not confuse the register in the data network with the register in the mobile network.

Each time a disconnection of a determined context is executed, you can opt to **deregister** the data network module (**detach**) or permit it to always remain registered. This is achieved through the **ALWAYS-ATTACHED** command.

Example:

2.4.11 SIM

Configures double SIM management in cases where the hardware supports this. The SIMs are identified through the SIM port where they're located. Depending on the hardware, the SIMs are identified as internal SIM and external SIM, or as SOCKET-1 and SOCKET-2. You need to open up the device in order to handle the internal SIM but not with the external SIM.

The double SIM management/supervision identifies a main SIM and a backup SIM. The main SIM is identified through the **SIM-SELECT** command in this interface and is the one that's initially used. You can establish a series of criteria to supervise the main SIM and in cases where one of them matches, the backup SIM is used. You can also define some criteria in order to use the backup SIM so when one of these matches the device returns from backup.

When the main SIM is active, the NSM/NSLA poll status can be supervised. When the backup SIM is active, the criteria for return from backup are: interface inactivity time (i.e. time when calls are not processed), the status of an NSM/NSLA poll and a time condition (the SIM is used during a given maximum time or up to a given time). For further information on polls, please manuals *Dm749-I NSM* and *Dm754-I NSLA*.

The parameters are checked every 30 seconds. When configuring the supervision parameters, you need to bear in mind that the switch from one SIM to another is a slow process.

Syntax:

When a switch has occurred, this is reported through the WWAN subsystem events.

There are specific and non-configurable situations that provoke a switch from one SIM to another: if a fault in the access to the SIM is detected or the SIM is blocked and requires the PUK. In the same way, there are situations that pause the switch process: when an erroneous PIN is configured.

This command is not available in interfaces whose hardware does not have a double SIM or in interfaces that are not either the base or the main interface.

2.4.11.1 SIM EXTERNAL-SOCKET-1

Configures the data the external SIM or the SIM in the SIM1 port uses.

If you don't configure the PIN and LOCAL-ADDRESS fields together with those for the internal SIM/SIM-2-port you cannot enable management/supervision for the double SIM and consequently the **SIM SUPERVISION** command is not available. In the same way, if one of these parameters is deleted, the management/supervision is automatically disabled.

Syntax:

- Associate dial interfaces to the said SIM so the interfaces using this SIM are available or UP when the SIM is active. When it is inactive, the interfaces are DOWN or unavailable.
- · Routes the incoming audio calls in VoIP context.

The association between SIM and the dial interfaces (FR, PPP, etc.) is executed through the profiles configured in GLOBAL-PROFILES DIAL and the LOCAL-ADDRESS field for these: when a SIM is active, all the dial interfaces that it has as base interface and that use profiles whose local-address coincides with the active SIM's activate. Those interfaces that fulfill the first condition but not the second see the base interface as down and remain DOWN or not available

Syntax:

2.4.11.1.3 SIM EXTERNAL-SOCKET-1 NETWORK-MODE

This command is not used in GPRS interfaces.

2.4.11.2 SIM EXTERNAL-SOCKET-2

Configures the data the internal SIM or the SIM in the SIM2 port uses.

2.4.11.2.2 SIM INTERNAL-SOCKET-2 LOCAL-ADDRESS

- Associate dial interfaces to the said SIM so the interfaces using this SIM are available or UP when the SIM is active. When it is inactive, the interfaces are DOWN or unavailable.
- · Routes the incoming audio calls in VoIP context.

The association between SIM and the dial interfaces (FR, PPP, etc.) is executed through the profiles configured in GLOBAL-PROFILES DIAL and the LOCAL-ADDRESS field for these: when a SIM is active, all the dial interfaces that it has as base interface and that use profiles whose local-address coincides with the active SIM's activate. Those interfaces that fulfill the first condition but not the second see the base interface as down and remain DOWN or not available

Syntax:

Default is no number configured.

2.4.11.2.3 SIM INTERNAL-SOCKET-2 NETWORK-MODE

This command is not used in GPRS interfaces.

This command is only meant for devices that have a module with technology higher than 2G incorporated, i.e. UMTS, HSPA, LTE...

2.4.11.3 SIM NSLA-CRITERIA

Configures an NSM/NSLA poll as supervision criteria for the main SIM. This criterion is useful to use when you want to supervise an IP connection at a given point through the main SIM. This connection not only implies a wireless connection but also the whole connection with the required destination.

The NSM/NSLA poll is made up of an NSM poll which sends a type of IP traffic to a known destination through an active interface when the main SIM is active. The sent traffic permits taking measurements that the NSLA Advisor uses and it is this latter that decides if the connection is valid or not. If the connection isn't valid then switch to SIM backup is executed. This parameter configures the NSLA-Advisor that determines if the connection is valid or not. For further information on configuring polls, please see manuals *Dm749-I NSM* and *Dm754-I NSLA*.

Syntax:

gprs0/0 AT config>SIM nsla-criteria nsla-advisor <id>

Admits a value between 0 and 65535. A 0 value disables this parameter as supervision criteria for the main SIM. Default is that this criterion is not enabled for main SIM supervision.

You need to remember that when using NSM/NSLA polls, the NSM poll doesn't stop sending traffic under any circumstances and therefore still sends traffic when the active SIM is the backup one.

Another detail for the use of NSLA-Advisors for this task is that the NSLA-Advisor, the NSLA-Alarm and the NSLA-Filter used activate and deactivate depending on the main SIM state, therefore we recommend that they are not used for other tasks.

An application example can be found in the appendix on examples.

2.4.11.4 SIM CONNECTION-TIMEOUT

This parameter sets the maximum time permitted to establish the data communication through the GPRS interface, for the SIM operating at that point. This parameter must be set because of the way the NSLA polls operate. Under certain circumstances if you only use NSLA polls you may not detect data link failure or drop. Consequently you must configure this parameter if configuring NSL polls.

This parameter affects the two SIMs. It only activates when the double SIM supervision activation option is configured through the **SIM SUPERVISION ENABLE** command.

The parameter is associated to a timer, which permits you to control the maximum wait time from the point where a SIM switch is executed until the associated NSLA poll indicates there is connectivity. If this timer times out the poll hasn't detected connectivity, SIM switch occurs. Also given the nature of the NSLA polls, as soon as the timer times out, the state of the poll is verified again. This permits you to rule out poll trigger problems when the SIMs are switching from one to the other.

This timer starts up when the GPRS interface has initialized correctly i.e. when this is able to establish a data connection.

This parameter is **unique and the same** for both SIMs. It only activates if the NSLA poll associated to the SIM has been configured.



You must be particularly care when configuring the NSLA polls associated to each SIM as the detection time must always be less than the connection-timeout. Contrariwise it's possible that the SIMs will switch as when the timer times out, the poll will not have detected connectivity.

Syntax:

This admits values between 0 and 1200 seconds. A 0 value disables this parameter as a supervision criteria for the active SIM. Default is 300 seconds.

2.4.11.5 SIM RETURN-CRITERIA

Configures the return to main SIM criteria. The return criterion is: physical interface inactivity (made up of the base interface and the secondary interface if there is one), the state of an NSM/NSLA poll, the state of registration in the base station and the time the backup SIM has been used.

Configures an NSM/NSLA poll as a return to main SIM criteria. This criterion is useful to use when you want to supervise an IP connection at a given point through the backup SIM. This connection not only implies a wireless connection but also the whole connection with the required destination.

The NSM/NSLA poll is made up of an NSM poll which sends a type of IP traffic to a known destination through an

active interface when the backup SIM is active. The sent traffic permits taking measurements that the NSLA Advisor uses and it is this latter that decides if the connection is valid or not. If the connection isn't valid then switch to main SIM is executed. This parameter configures the NSLA-Advisor that determines if the connection is valid or not. For further information on configuring polls, please see manuals *Dm749-1 NSM* and *Dm754-1 NSLA*.

2.4.11.6.1 SIM SUPERVISION ENABLE

2.4.13 SMS

The router permits SMS to be used for those interfaces which support this (e.g. ARLY).

The only parameters which need to be configured to enable SMS reception are the SIM card PIN number and the SMS services center telephone number. Both parameters must be obtained from the mobile telephone service provider.



Note

For Spain, if you service provider is Movistar, the service center number is +34609090909, if it's Vodafone +34607003110 and if it's Orange +34656000311.

The configuration commands for a device whose PIN is 2808 and the services center is +34656000311 are shown below.

2.9.3 Double SIM management

This example shows the capacity of double SIM management/supervision. Two NSM/NSLA polls are used to supervise the SIMs and the use of the backup SIM is limited to 4 minutes.

The NSM polls checks the connection through pins to a known address at a rate of once per 5 seconds. One poll is used for the main SIM and another for the backup SIM.

Chapter 3 Monitoring

3.1 Interface Monitoring Commands

The commands added to the generic **AT** commands interface to control the GPRS connection and numerated and described in this section. The result of these commands depends on the module installed in the device.

Command	Function
?(HELP)	Permits you to view the available commands or the options for each of these com- mands.
AT-MODE	Sends AT commands directly to the module.
BITRATE	Real time monitoring of the connection data speed.
COMMAND	Sends AT commands to the module.
DISCONNECT	Sends the disconnect command.
GPRS	Sends predefined AT commands to the module for information.
LIST	Lists the current parameters for the interface.
RESET	Reset command to the module.
SIM-MANAGEMENT	Commands related to double SIM management monitoring.
EXIT	Returns to the previous menu.

3.1.1 ? (HELP)

You can use the ? (HELP) command to list all the commands that are valid at the level where the router is being monitored. This command can also be used after a specific command to list the available options for it.

Chapter 4 GSM/GPRS Coverage

4.1 Monitoring

Signal coverage monitoring and parameters relative to the GSM/GPRS connection is accessed in the Commands Line Interface **Process 3** or **P 3** menu in the device console (Please see manual *Dm704-I Configuration and Monitoring*). Once in this menu, enter the GPRS interface menu you wish to monitor, e.g. **net gprs0/1**.

This menu contains a direct connection mode with the module through an **AT** commands interface. To enter this mode, type **AT** command.

Please note that on entering the **AT** commands mode when there is an established data communication, either through a GSM call or a GPRS context, the data communication is interrupted until you exit the **AT** commands mode.

4.1.1 Considerations

Routers with the Siemens MC35/MC35i module only have a GPRS net ("net gprs0/0") available, i.e. it only permits you to have a single defined GPRS context at any given moment. Therefore, with this type of module, when entering the commands mode the data connection is interrupted making it impossible to remotely enter the commands mode from the GPRS network.

Routers with the Siemens MC45 module have two GPRS networks (**net gprs0/0** and **net gprs0/1**) i.e. permit two GPRS contexts to be defined and established simultaneously. Therefore, with this module, it is possible to have an established data connection and without interrupting it, enter monitoring in **AT** commands mode from the other network (the GSM/GPRS coverage and other parameters are common, as the router only has one GSM/GPRS interface, although you can define two GPRS contexts and share the traffic between them, you can only execute one GSM call simultaneously). Logically, if the two contexts are established, one of these must be interrupted in order to enter the commands mode. Lastly, as the module is class B, you cannot have a GSM call and a GPRS context simultaneously running traffic. This is due to the fact that when the call is established, the GPRS traffic is interrupted altough the GPRS context and attach in principal remain active during the GSM call, and reestablish when the GSM call ends, commencing data traffic once more.

4.1.2 Coverage monitoring commands

Useful coverage monitoring commands exist for both the Siemens MC35/MC35i modules as well as for the MC45 modules and are described below.

4.1.2.1 at^moni

Offers information on the cell that the router is currently connected to and on its coverage parameters. You can directly execute the **AT^MONI** command in order to view the current parameters or use the **AT^MONI** =N command so the output updates every n seconds, n being between 1 and 254.

4.1.3 Criteria for Quality of Coverage

When measuring the quality of coverage in a specific place, you need to bear in mind that not only does this affect the level of the received power in the serving cell, but it also affects the difference of power received between the serving cell and the neighbors. Not receiving enough power from any cell is almost as bad as receiving similar power from various cells. This is due to the face that if a similar power is received from various cells, there is a high possibility that more cell hops will occur (**handovers**) which prejudice the communication quality. This is especially sensitive in the case of GPRS, where behavior with large and different transmission delays including intermittent losses has been observed, in cases where there is insufficient coverage.

The least theoretic reception power must coincide with the sensitivity (**RXLev** parameter), generally between – 103 dBm and – 111 dBm, depending on the carrier. It is worth giving this power a margin of at least 10 dB to protect it against signal fading caused by various reasons, which leaves the minimum power criteria required in the region of – 93 dBm. For GPRS and with a stricter criterion, this minimum power should be considered in the region of –80 dBm, although with power between -80 and – 93 dBm, functionality can also be viable. To avoid cell changes, it is also convenient that the reception power in the first neighbor cell is at least 6 dB less than the serving cell.

4.1.4 Positioning the antenna

In general, the calculation of the coverage parameters described above, has small oscillations for a given location, which should be considered as normal. Therefore, in order to obtain the reference values, we recommend taking various samples from each parameter (e.g. executing the **AT^MONI=3** command for half a minute) and estimating the average.

Given the above explanation, the installation guide or the selection criteria for the best position for the antenna can be summarized in the following way:

- (1) Look for an initial antenna location, where you consider reception should be adequate (high enough, away from vertical metal surfaces etc).
- (2) In compliance with the **chann** parameter, identify the frequencies band for the serving cell and the neighbors in order to use the appropriate antenna in cases where there are various options. Unidirectional antennas can usually only be adjusted to a determined band whereas omni directional antennas are more likely to be dual.
- (3) If the reception power dBm parameter is better than -80 dBm, go to point 5.
- (4) If the reception power is between -80 and -93 dBm, try and find a better location (and return to point one).
- (5) Check that the first neighbor cell reception level is at least 6 dB less than the serving cell. If this is the case then you can consider the antenna location to be appropriate. If not, then return to point 1 should you require a more reliable coverage at all times, in order to find a better location.

Chapter 5 Upgrading Firmware

5.1 Introduction

Given the rapid progress of cellular technology, it's essential that the devices used in the access solutions can be upgraded with the latest features available.

Some Teldat devices that incorporate GPRS cellular technology have a mechanism to update the firmware for the hardware module implementing this technology.

This procedure consists of the following steps:

- · Obtaining the upgraded software.
- Transferring the software to the device through FTP.
- · Loading it in the card cellular telephony module.

5.2 Procedure

5.2.1 Obtaining the upgrade

In order to execute firmware upgrading, you need to have the appropriate loading file for the module requiring upgrading. In the same way, you also need information on the type and version of the installed module in order to determine which firmware versions are compatible.

The firmware for the various types of modules, as well as the possible versions for each of them, is available for the user from the Teldat Technical Service. To obtain this firmware, please contact the Teldat Technical Service and give them all the information on the module. This information can be found on the device monitoring console.

The file containing the new module firmware has a *UPF extension.

5.2.2 Transferring to the device

The Teldat routers have an FTP server to which they can transfer files to upgrade the device software or to load firmware for internal devices. This server is only accessible if the device has started up correctly (application being executed).

The steps to carry out to execute an upgrade are as follows:

- (1) Place the upgrade file in a directory in the machine where you are going to launch the FTP session.
- (2) In order to carry out the upgrading process, the device must have enough space in the memory to store the upgrading file. Likewise, the FTP temporary buffer must have more space in it than the file you wish to load. We

recommend that you previously configure the FTP server with the **TEMP-BUFF** command. For further information on the FTP server, please see manual *Dm724-I FTP Protocol*. *Example:*

- (3) Connect to the device's FTP server (you need a user and password; by default the user is "root" without a password).
- (4) Configure the binary mode through the bin command.
- (5) Transfer the file containing the firmware through the put myfmwr.upf command.
- (6) Once the transfer has finished, disconnect through the bye command.

5.2.3 Upgrading the module

- (1) Access the base interface (gprsX/0) monitoring menu for the card you wish to update as indicated in the chapter on monitoring.
- (2) Execute the **MODULE UPGRADE-FRM** command to start loading for the module. If you have not previously loaded the upgrade file in the RAM, you will receive an error message.
- (3) Wait until the process finishes. During this process, some points and messages will appear indicating the upgrading progress and state. These messages and points can be different depending on the type of module you are upgrading.

Do not under any circumstances switch off or restart the device during this process.

(4) Check that this is the correct version through the interface LIST command.
