Chapter 1 Introduction


1.1 PLC PRIME

In the past few years, some European governments have been passing legislation that forces electrical utilities to provide customers with readings of their electrical consumption.

This new legislation requires that all domestic electricity meters can be remotely managed and include a real-time reading system. These new electricity meters, which will need to be permanently connected to centralized control centers (SCADA), are called smart meters and are now part of the so-called smart grid.

Power Line Communication (PLC) technology is gaining widespread acceptance as one of the preferred technologies for the implementation of smart grids. PLC uses the electricity transmission lines themselves to deploy the telecommunications functionalities. Since the grid itself provides the physical communication channel needed to implement the smart grid concept, there is no need to invest in additional infrastructure.

The PRIME (PowerRline Intelligent Metering Evolution) standard emerged in response to the new Spanish legislation ruling. The aim of PRIME was to create an open, non-proprietary public standard. The PRIME Alliance was created to provide a discussion forum aimed at defining the standard. It brings together the different key players in the electricity distribution industry: distribution companies, meter manufacturers, semiconductor companies, telecommunications companies and research institutions.




PRIME is based on PLC technology for low voltage electrical networks. It is a PLC system for narrowband data transmission, based on Orthogonal Frequency Division Multiplexing (OFDM). Its main features are:

- Operates on CENELEC A-B-C, FCC and ARIB bands
- OFDM-based technology.
- · Several types of digital coding: DBPSK, DQPSK, D8PSK

Prime model layers

PRIME defines several layers at the communications layer:



Convergence layer (CL)

This layer classifies traffic by associating it with its MAC connection address. This layer performs the mapping of any kind of data traffic and may include header suppression functions. The convergence layer is divided into two sublayers:

Common Part Convergence Sublayer (CPCS). This provides a set of generic services: Segmentation and Reassembly.

• Service Specific Convergence Sublayer (SSCS). This defines the type of communication between the different subnet nodes. It is responsible for delivering the data exchanged between nodes to the management application layer of the smart grid.

PRIME specifies 4 kinds of SSCS:

- NULL
- IEC-61334-4-32
- IPv4
- IPv6

MAC layer (MAC)

The PRIME MAC layer provides core MAC functionalities such as:

- · Channel access
- · Bandwidth allocation
- Connection establishment/maintenance.
- · Topology resolution.

This layer provides two interfaces: an interface to the CL named MAC SAP (Service Access Point) and an interface to the Management Plane called MLME (MAC Layer Management Entity) SAP. The first one is mainly used for data transmissions over a PRIME network, while the second is used to externally modify the configuration and the behavior of this layer.

Each node has a universal MAC address - 48 bits (the EUI-48; IEEE Std 802-2001). Each manufacturer assigns this address during the manufacturing process. Said address is used to universally identify a node during network registration. Each subnetwork only has one Base Node, so the EUI-48 of the Base Node identifies its subnetwork uniquely. This EUI-48 is called the Subnetwork Address (SNA).

A Base Node is primarily responsible for setting up and maintaining a subnetwork. In order to execute its task, the Base Node performs the following:

- · Beacon transmission at fixed intervals of time
- · Promotion and demotion of terminals and switches
- · Device registration management
- · Connection setup and management
- Channel access arbitration
- Distribution of random sequences to obtain encryption keys
- · Multicast group management

Physical layer (PHY)

Implements the transmission and reception physical layer between neighboring nodes using OFDM technology. It adapts data connection speeds based on the signal.

The PRIME PHY layer is designed to transmit and receive over power lines originally intended for power distribution at 50-60 Hz AC.

Using this medium for communications at higher frequencies poses some technically challenging problems:

- Distribution networks are usually made up of a random variety of conductor types, which translates into loads of different impedances. Such a network has an amplitude and phase response that varies widely with frequency. Furthermore, the channel characteristics can also vary with time as the loads on the network change.
- Interference also affects power lines. Electric appliances with different kind of motors, as well as switching power supplies and halogen lamps, create impulse noises that reduce the reliability of communication signals. The noise is also location-dependent due to attenuation.

Thanks to its combination of approaches, the PRIME PHY layer allows for robust high speed and low cost communications over power lines. This simple yet powerful scheme is based on adaptively modulated Orthogonal Frequency Division Multiplexing (OFDM), along with forward error correction and data interleaving.

The frequency band used depends on local regulations, which ranges from 3 kHz to 500 kHz. Its application is subject to the local regulations in force, e.g., EN 50065 1:2001+A1:2010 in Europe or FCC part 15 in the US.

PRIME 1.3 release can operate in the CENELEC-A band only.

Differential modulations are used, with one of three possible constellations: DBPSK, DQPSK or D8PSK. An additive scrambler is used to prevent long sequences of identical bits from arising. Finally, ½ rate convolutional coding and repetition code will be used along with bit interleaving.

PRIME subnet functional description

The topology generated by a PRIME communications network has a tree structure. There are two kinds of nodes defined by PRIME to develop this structure type:

- BASE NODE
- SERVICE NODE

Communication between the Base node and the Service nodes is carried out in accordance with a master/slave model

The PRIME Alliance has defined two release of the standard PRIME:

- PRIME 1.3
- PRIME 1.4

The PRIME 1.4 release include some improvements which allow to increase network performance and reliability. Both releases are not compatible, this means that all elements in a PRIME network must have the same PRIME release.

1.2 PRIME Base Node


The Base Node (also known as hub or PRIME data hub) represents the center or root of the system, with all communications originating there. Base nodes are usually connected to secondary substations (electrical infrastructures where the voltage is stepped down to lower values). Base nodes are responsible for controlling all dependent subnets, including all the service nodes.

The PRIME Gateway can operate as a Base Node and a Service Node. The most common mode of operation is Base Node.

1.3 PRIME Service Node

Each node in a PRIME subnet is called a Service Node. Among other functionalities, service nodes are responsible for implementing the smart meters. In order to cover greater distances and improve performance in the PRIME subnet, service nodes can have two states in the PRIME subnet environment:

- **TERMINAL**: A service node is in TERMINAL state when it is the last device in the PRIME subnet tree structure (that is, no other service node depends on it to gain access to the Base Node).
- **SWITCH**: In certain circumstances, service nodes can be promoted to SWITCH state. When a service node is promoted to SWITCH state, it relays data exchanged between the Base Node and a Service Node connected to the subnet. The service node changes its state in real time, depending on the network conditions (attenuation, noise, etc.). This change in state is dynamic, so it can change back and forth over time.



The PRIME Gateway acts as Service Node only to provide IP connection between a Base Node and a PRIME subnetwork. That is, the Service Node operates always in SWITCH mode and transfers all PLC PRIME traffic from the local subnet to the Base Node. This functionality mode is known as PHY layer extension or TICKET-65 on PRIME Alliance.





1.4 PRIME topology

PRIME uses the grid to create and maintain the subnet topology. It allows the smart grid to be monitored in real time. A PRIME subnet is mainly used to access the smart meters.

A PRIME subnetwork is a tree with the two types of nodes: a Base Node and several Service Nodes.



The PRIME Gateway offers a variety of tools that help monitor the subnetwork topology in real time, as well as store changes using events. This information can be accessed through CLI, SNMP or FTP sessions.


1.5 DLMS-COSEM over TCP

PRIME has adopted the IEC 62056 suite (DLMS-COSEM) as the preferred choice of application layer for smart grid deployments.


DLMS is a suite of open standards developed and maintained by the DLMS User Association. COSEM is part of the

DLMS protocol stack. DLMS primarily covers two protocols (the Application protocol and the Transport protocol) that define the standard method to model and transfer metered data and other classified functions of the energy meter. These protocols are officially endorsed and registered by the International Electrotechnical Commission (IEC) under IEC 62056.



The PRIME Gateway allows the Data Concentrator Unit for Smart Meters to communicate with the meters connected to the PRIME subnetwork on the Base Node. The PRIME Gateway provides transparent access to meters (Service Nodes) through the PRIME Convergence Link Layer (LLC) with IEC-61334-4-32 connections. Connection between the application and the PRIME Gateway is obtained through a TCP/IP session.





1.6 Firmware Upgrade Protocol

When in Base Node mode, the PRIME Gateway can upgrade the firmware of all service nodes connected to the PRIME network. To make this task easier, the Base Node implements the Firmware Upgrade Protocol.

The purpose of the Firmware Upgrade Protocol is to manage firmware upgrade operations in PRIME Base Nodes from any external application, such as Data Concentrators or Network Management Systems. The connection between the Management System and the Base Node is done through a TCP/IP session.

The protocol used to exchange the messages between the Base Node and the Management System is a custom simple binary protocol. When the application wants to start a Firmware Upgrade process, it establishes a TCP/IP connection with the FUP port configured in the Base Node. This connection remains open until the process is completed.



The Firmware Upgrade Protocol defines a set of messages that enable the configuration and firmware updating of Service Nodes.

The Service Nodes to upgrade are selected based on a list which includes the PRIME MAC address of selected Nodes. This list is sent to the Base Node in a FUP command.

The most important features of the Firmware Upgrade mechanism are the following

- · Ability to work in unicast and multicast.
- May change the size of data packets depending on channel conditions.
- Ability to request basic information from the Service Nodes at any time (such as device model, firmware version, etc.).
- Can be canceled at any time.
- Can check the integrity of the downloaded FW once reception is complete.
- The new firmware is executed in the Service Nodes only when commanded to do so.
- Ability to reject the new firmware after a "test" period and switch to the former version.

In environments where a Firmware Upgrade Protocol application is not available, the PRIME Gateway implements a way to initiate and cancel a limited FUP process.

The FUP command in the monitoring menu helps trigger a local FUP process. See *FUP* on page 30 under the monitoring menu.

For more information on FUP implementation, please contact our support department.

1.7 PHY Layer Extension feature

The PHY Layer Extension is a feature designed to increase the number of Service Nodes that a Base Node can control in a Multi-transformer Secondary Substation scenario.

Generally speaking, in secondary substations with multiple transformers (and where low voltage lines are independent of each other), there is not enough power transfer of PRIME PLC signal between low voltage busbars. Service Nodes that are electrically connected to a different transformer to the one the Base Node is connected to are not able to communicate properly. For them to behave well in a PRIME network, a Base Node will need to be installed for each transformer.

Thanks to the PHY layer extension feature, installing several Base Nodes in a substation with multiple transformers



is not necessary.

For it to work, a repeater must be installed in each of the additional busbars found on the secondary transformers. The repeater reproduces Base Node messages addressed to any Service Node connected to the secondary busbars. This repeater can be found in a special Service Node known as an Auxiliary Node.

From the point of view of the PRIME PLC network, the Auxiliary Node always behaves as a PRIME SWITCH. It always registers in the Base Node as a SWITCH. The PHY layer communication between the Base Node and the Auxiliary Node is carried out through UDP/IP datagrams.

The following image depicts a scenario where a Base Node is able to manage the Service Nodes connected to two different transformers in a substation.



The PRIME Gateway, in Base Node mode, may connect to several Service Nodes that work as Auxiliary Nodes.

The PRIME Gateway, in Service Node mode, is able to work as an Auxiliary Node.

The PHY layer extension for the Multi-transformer Secondary Substation feature is also known as Ticket#65.



Note

The PHY Layer Extension feature is not available in all PRIME devices. Please contact our Technical Service for more information on the devices that support this feature.

1.8 PRIME Sniffer

From the PRIME Node, the PRIME Gateway can monitor the PRIME packets in the PLC network transfered between connected nodes.

The Sniffer protocol has been developed to monitor data traffic on power line networks. This tool focuses on the PRIME (versions 1.3 and 1.4) protocol. The PRIME Gateway snoops the power line to catch the PRIME packets at the PHY layer. The PRIME Gateway will send the packet sent over the network through a TCP/IP connection. The sniffer tool can be used to:

- · Analyze network problems
- Gather network statistics and report on them
- · Monitor network usage
- · Debug network protocols
- · Improve network understanding

Sniffer frames contain the received PDU and some extra information related to the PHY layer, which is included in

the header part:

- · Sniffer frame version: 2 bytes
- · Sniffer type version
- · Modulation scheme of the received frame
- · Length of the PDU in PHY symbols
- PRIME-defined measurement of the SNR
- · Channel in which the frame has been received
- TimeStart/TimeEnd: high precision internal counter to measure the length (time) of the PDUs in hundredths of microseconds
- RSSI in dBuV
- CRC flag to indicate if the PLC frame has a valid CRC.
- · Length of the PDU in bytes

The Sniffer data can be sent to a Sniffer application or a TCP server controlled by SNMP commands.

The information gathered from the PRIME Sniffer Protocol by the PRIME Gateway can be sent through a TCP session to a Sniffer application. The Sniffer application must open the TCP session to the Gateway.

The Gateway supports several SNMP commands allowing TCP transfer of Sniffer data. For SNMP Sniffer control, the Gatway opens a TCP session in a TCP sever configured by SNMP.

The format of sniffer data varies depending on the transfer method. For Sniffer applications, the data format is the one used with the Microchip PLC Sniffer tool. For SNMP commands, the data format is the one described in *Sniffer format for SNMP managed TCP sessions* on page 63.

1.9 SNMP management

PRIME gateway devices support the SNMP management protocol. To fully manage the PRIME network, the PRIME Gateway includes a SNMP MIB for the PRIME interface.

The PRIME MIB may be loaded from teldat-mon-interf-prime-mib.mib

This MIB may provide the following information about the PRIME network:

- · Network uptime.
- Statistics about the number of terminals, number of switches, switching levels, nodes per levels, a list of active
 connections and their type.
- Periodic statistical information. Integrated values for a period defined by three superframes duration (approx. 1 minute). Periodic information for 60 periods and the global accumulated value for:
 - · Number of topology changes: Promotion, demotions, registrations and deregistrations.
 - Coverage: ALIVE messages successful, Total ALIVE messages.
 - · Availability.
- Instantaneous "image" of the subnetwork topology. Table including all Service Nodes connected to the network and some relevant parameters.
- PLC channel occupation. Integrated values for a period defined by three superframes (approx. 1 minute). Periodic
 information for 60 periods and the global accumulated value for:
 - PHY level: CFP, SCP and ERROR packets.
 - MAC level: Beacons, Control and Data packets.

Several commands stemming from the SNMP protocol can make the Gateway start a TCP session in order to transfer specific information. When enabled, the PRIME Gateway sends selected information to a SNMP-configured TCP server. The following session types can be handled through SNMP commands:

- Topology events in real time.
- PRIME PHY layer sniffer. It sends information about the PLC messages exchanged between Nodes, as well as the PLC PHY PDU.

Sniffer format for SNMP managed TCP sessions on page 63 describes what the data format is for this kind of transfers.

Chapter 2 Configuration

2.1 Getting the PRIME Interface

The PRIME Interface is the configuration menu where all configuration options for the PRIME Gateway can be set.

To access the PRIME interface configuration menu, first access the general configuration menu. From there, access the PRIME interface.

In this example, the PRIME interface appears as prime 0/0.

PRIME configuration commands must be entered in the configuration menu associated with the PRIME interface (*PRIME-primeX/Y Config>*). To access this menu, enter the **NETWORK primeX/Y** command from the general configuration menu (*Config>*).

2.2.1 BN-CHANNEL

This parameter configures the frequency channel used by the BN to build the PRIME network. All SNs connected to the network must be able to detect or configure the frequency selected. This functionally only affects PRIME 1.4 operation. The frequency used for each channel is defined under PRIME 1.4 specifications.

It accepts values ranging from 1 to 8. The default value is 1.

2.2.2 FUP-PORT

This parameter configures the local listening TCP port for incoming TCP sessions from a Firmware Upgrade Protocol (FUP) remote application. This port provides the input path needed to access the FUP on the PRIME Gateway. FUP performs firmware updates on Service Nodes connected to the PRIME network that can be accessed by the Gateway. FUP is designed to carry out easier and faster firmware updates of Service Nodes.

It accepts values ranging from 1 to 65535. Default is 502.

2.2.7 NODE-MODE

Service Node mode is intended to be used as a PLC PRIME switch on the PHY layer extension feature (Ticket#65). This mode provides access to all Service Nodes connected to a power line, but links the PRIME PHY layer to a Base Node through an IP/UDP connection.

2.2.8 PHY-LAYER-EXTENSION

The PRIME Gateway includes a feature that makes it possible to deploy the PRIME network through a power line that is not directly connected to the Base Node. This feature is known as PRIME PHY layer extension or Ticket#65.

To do this, you must add a Service Node to the network that supports the PHY layer extension feature.

Communication between the Base Node and the Service Node for the expansion of the PRIME PHY layer is performed through UDP/IP datagrams.

The PRIME Gateway can operate as Base Node or Service Node. Both operation modes support the PRIME PHY layer extension feature.

Immediately after registering on the Base Node, the PRIME Gateway in Service Node mode becomes a SWITCH. The Service Node acts as a repeater for PHY PLC messages sent from the Base Node over the power line where it is connected.

2.2.12 TOPOLOGY

The PRIME Gateway can collect, in real time, topological data of the PRIME network associated with the Base Node. This information contains all state change events in the Service Nodes of PLC networks and is stored in files that can be sent to a server via FTP.

The main purpose of the TOPOLOGY feature is to keep the information about the state of all network Service Nodes updated in a management server. Changes in data are updated periodically, based on the time configured. If, between two periods of file saving, the number of stored events reaches the number configured on "file-max-lines parameter", the file will be updated too.

The file name will have the following format:

prefix_yyyymmdd_hhmmss.csv

The meaning of each field is the following:

- prefix: configured file prefix. All files include the same prefix.
- yyyy: year when file sending starts.
- mm: month when file sending starts.
- dd: day when file sending starts.
- hh: hour when file sending starts.
- mm: minute when file sending starts.
- ss: second when file sending starts.

The Gateway will send as many files as needed until the functionality is disabled.

If file sending fails, the Gateway will try again after 10 minutes. It will try 5 times before discarding the file.

When this functionality is enabled, the Gateway generates a special file every 24 hours which contains the Service Nodes currently registered on the Base Node.

While the functionality is enabled, files will not be sent if there are no changes in the PLC network topology .

Topological data can be shown through a monitoring CLI tool. See the monitoring section for more information.

3.2.2 FUP

This parameter must only be configured for Service Nodes that use PRIME version 1.4 and when the algorithm used is not NONE.

The FW algorithm and its length are defined by the Service Node manufacturer, who is responsible for providing these parameters.

3.2.2.3.2 Transfer Service Node firmware

When it comes to upgrading device software or loading firmware for internal devices, the PRIME Gateway has an FTP server it can transfer files to.

This server is only accessible if the device has initiated correctly (application executed).

The firmware of the Service Nodes to be upgraded using the FUP command must be uploaded to PRIME Gateway through FTP before the FUP process starts. Only one firmware can be loaded at a time (meaning that only the Service Nodes that are compatible with this firmware will be upgraded).

Follow these steps to upgrade:

- (1) Save the upgrade file in a directory that belongs to the device from which you are going to launch the FTP session.
- (2) Connect to the FTP server (default is user root and no password).
- (3) Configure the binary mode through the **bin** command.
- (4) Transfer the file containing the firmware using the **put myfmwr.zzz** command. The .bin and .img file extensions are not allowed. Rename file extensions if necessary.
- (5) Once the transfer is complete, disconnect using the bye command.

3.2.3.2 AVAILABILITY

The availability command shows the quality and stability of the PRIME network. It is a list that includes statistical information on several key network parameters.

The Gateway integrates the statistical values for each period defined by three superframes (duration: ~1 minute).

The Gateway keeps the information for 60 periods (180 superframes). On top of this, the node also saves the accumulated values generated since the last network reset. The first listed element is the accumulated value, the second is the last period, the third is the period before that and so on.

The statistical information is displayed in a table with 61 rows and 9 columns. The first row (it. acc) shows the accumulated value since Base Node initialization or reset.

The availability parameters listed are the following:

- It.: Item listed (the first is the accumulated value) based on their period. The periods are listed from most to least recent.
- Promo.: Number of promotions that have occurred during the period.
- Demot.: Number of demotions that have occurred during the period.
- Reg.: Number of registrations that have occurred during the period.
- Unreg.: Number of unregistrations that have occurred during the period.
- Suc Alv.: Number of success alive sequences that have occurred during the period.
- Tot Alv.: Total number of live sequences sent during the period.
- · Avail.: Average availability.

The accumulated value (first value in the table) is calculated as the average availability of the different nodes registered (at least once in that period) in the subnetwork. The accumulated value (row 1) will take into account every data registered since the last reset.

Period availability (from it.values 0 to -59) is calculated as the average availability of the different nodes registered, at least once, in the subnetwork.

• num.SN: Number of Service Nodes detected in the period, used when calculating availability.

This information can also be obtained by means of the SNMP protocol.

The following FUP parameters are listed:

- Process status: indicates the status of the global FUP process. This status value is reported to the remote FUP application when required. The status can take the following values:
 - (a) IDLE
 - (b) RECEIVING
 - (c) RELEASING
 - (d) UPGRADING
 - (e) ACTIVATING SWITCHES
- FUP control process status: indicates the status of the FUP process at the PRIME PLC level. The status can take
 the following values:
 - (a) STOPPED
 - (b) RUNNING
- PLC statistics: displays several counters on the data exchanged with the PRIME modem.
- TCP data statistics: displays several counters on the data exchanged with the FUP application through a TCP session.
- TCP connection statistics: displays several counters related to the TCP sessions used by the FUP application to connect to the PRIME Gateway. It also displays, if active, some relevant information about the TCP session.
- FUP current session configuration: displays the configuration parameters received from the FUP application to perform the process. When the process is launched from the local console, the configuration parameters are always the same.  - (d) STATE: indicates the state of the FUP process for each Service Node. This status value is reported to the remote FUP application when required. It can take the following values: IDLE, CONFIGURED, UPGRADING, UPGRADED, KILLED, ERROR, TIMEOUT, REJECTED and ABORTED.
 - (e) STATUS: indicates the status of the FUP process for each Service Node. This value represents the status of the FUP received from the Service Node, in accordance with the PRIME standard. It can take following values: IDLE, RECEIVING, COMPLETE, COUNTDOWN and UPGRADE.
 - (f) PROGRESS: displays the firmware packets transferred, and the total packets to be transferred, to each Service Node.

3.2.3.6 PHY-LAYER-EXTENSION

The PHY-LAYER-EXTENSION list option displays information related to the PRIME PHY layer extension over UDP (Ticket#65). Through this command, the state of the PHY layer extension communication can be monitored.

The PHY layer extension feature is operative for the Base Node and Service Node modes.

In Base Node mode, when the PHY layer extension feature is enabled, the PRIME Gateway can access several Service Nodes over UDP. The Base Node sends all datagrams to the Service Nodes that have a record.

In Service Node mode, only one access to the associated Base Node is allowed. The Service Node sends all datagrams to its associated Base Node.

When it comes to the PHY layer extension feature, the PRIME Gateway keeps two communication types: one to its peer/s node/s via UDP datagrams, and another one to the internal PLC PRIME modem.

The list command option shows, separately, information for each data communication path and information about the current UDP status.

• PHY layer extension over UDP. Display the configuration and status that define UDP communications:

Configuration option: Indicates whether the PHY layer extension feature is enabled.

Connection status: Indicates if the PHY layer extension feature is running.

UDP local listen port: Displays active listening UDP port to receive incoming datagrams from the remote node/s.

For Base Node mode, several remote Service Nodes may appear.

- PLC Statistics: displays several counters on the data exchanged with the PRIME modem.
- UDP statistics: displays several counters on the data exchanged with the peer/s node/s through UDP datagrams.

3.2.3.7 MODEM-DEBUG-REPORT

The MODEM-DEBUG-REPORT list option displays debugging information linked to the PLC PRIME internal module. This information is usually intended for internal debugging purposes, as it may contain code errors or debugging results. This command also shows information about PLC RAM memory and PLC ZCD (Zero Cross Detector) sensor.

It shows the RAM memory size of the PLC modem and the result of its initial test.

The ZCD sensor generates a square signal, the command shows the time for each level (high and low). The sum of the high an low times should be around 20000 microseconds.

3.2.3.9 SNIFFER

The SNIFFER list option displays information relative to the PLC PRIME Sniffer protocol. Through this command, the Sniffer's communication state can be monitored.

The purpose of this command is to monitor the PRIME Sniffer connections and communication.

When it comes to the PRIME Sniffer protocol, the PRIME Gateway keeps two communications: one to the Sniffer Application via a TCP session, and another one to the internal PLC PRIME module.

Sniffer may be accessed by a Sniffer application, through an incoming TCP session, or by the SNMP protocol through an outgoing TCP session. Only one session is allowed. An SNMP session has priority over a Sniffer application session. If Sniffer is enabled and the Gateway receives an SNMP session request, the Sniffer session will be dropped.

- QIt: Quality, represents a correlation between the alive frames transmitted and received. Expressed in %.
- TxALV: Alive frames transmitted.
- . RxALV: Alive answer frames received.
- ALV-T: Amount of time in seconds that the system waits for an ALV answer message before assuming that the Service Node has been unregistered by the Base Node. Can take the following values: 32, 64, 128, 256, 512, 1024, 2048, 4096.
- **DISC**: Number of disconnections detected at the MAC layer level.
- UP-TIME: Total amount of time that the Node is in a connected state (Terminal or Switch).
- %: UP-TIME percentage regarding Base Node UP-TIME.
- CNX-TIME: Amount of time that the Node remains in a connected state (Terminal or Switch) in the current active connection. This time is 00:00:00 if the connection is not active.

3.2.5 UPGRADE-FIRMWARE

Chapter 4 Upgrading PRIME Firmware

4.1 Introduction

Given the ongoing optimization of PLC PRIME technology, upgrading the PLC module must be possible in order to offer the latest available features.

PRIME interfaces are equipped with a mechanism for PLC PRIME firmware upgrading.

Simply follow these steps:

- · Obtain the upgraded software.
- Transfer the software to the device through FTP.
- · Load it in the PLC PRIME module.

4.2 Procedure

4.2.1 Obtaining the upgrade

To carry out firmware upgrading, you need the loading file that matches the module that requires upgrading. Similarly, you also need information on the type and version of the installed module to determine which firmware versions are compatible.

The user may obtain firmware for various models of PLC modules, as well as the possible versions for each, from our Technical Service. Please contact our Technical Service and give them all the information on the module. This information can be found on the device monitoring console. There are several firmware versions for the PRIME module in base to device model: Base Node to support 30 Service Nodes, Base Node to support 150 Service Nodes, Base Node to support 2000 Service Nodes, Service Nodes compatible with PRIME version 1.36, compatible with PRIME version 1.4, etc.

Depending of the model, the PRIME Gateway should always have several firmwares loaded on its disk.

For example Regesta Compact PLC must include two firmwares: one for Service Node mode and one for Base Node mode. For Regesta Smart PLC must also include two firmwares: one for Base Node operation with PRIME 1.3 release and one for Base Node operation with PRIME 1.4 release.

When an upgrade process is performed, the PRIME Gateway loads the firmware according to the configured node mode or PRIME release. Therefore, before launching an upgrade process, care must be taken to ensure that the firmware to be upgraded is appropriate for the selected node mode or PRIME release.

Some license limits may cause an error in the upgrade process. For example, to upgrade the firmware of a Base Node that supports 2000 Service Nodes, the device must include the license to support 2000 Service Nodes.

Through the firmware version, you can identify the specific type to which it belongs. The last digit identifies the type of node and, in the case of a Base Node, the number of Service Nodes supported. The following examples show how the firmware versions are named:

 Firmware version for a Base Node mode supporting up to 30 Service Nodes (for Regesta Compact PLC only): 01.03.10.02-A-L

The "-L" character indicates that the firmware is for these type of Base Nodes.

 Firmware version for a Base Node mode supporting up to 150 Service Nodes (for Regesta Smart PLC only): 01.03.10.02-A-R

The "-R" character indicates that the firmware is for these type of Base Nodes.

 Firmware version for a Base Node mode supporting up to 750 Service Nodes(for Regesta Comact PLC only): 01.03.10.02-A-M

The "-M" character indicates that the firmware is for this type of Base Node. Note that this firmware version requires the PRIME Gateway to include the corresponding license.

 Firmware version for a Base Node mode supporting up to 2000 Service Nodes(for Regesta Smart PLC only): 01.03.10.04-B-F

The "-F" character indicates that the firmware is for this type of Base Node. Note that this firmware version requires the PRIME Gateway to include the corresponding license.

• Firmware version for Service Node mode: 01.03.10.02-A-S

The "-S" character indicates that the firmware is for this Service Node type.

The file containing the new module firmware has a *.BFW extension.

4.2.2 Transferring to the device

When it comes to upgrading the device software or loading firmware for internal devices, users have an FTP server they can transfer files to. This server is only accessible if the device has started up correctly (application executed).

Follow these steps to upgrade:

- (1) Load the upgrade file in a directory of the device where you are going to launch the FTP session.
- (2) To carry out upgrading, your device needs enough memory space to store the file. For further information, please see bintec manual Dm724-I FTP Protocol.
- (3) Connect to the device's FTP server (default is user root and no password).
- (4) Configure the binary mode through the bin command.
- (5) Transfer the file containing the firmware using the put myfmwr.bfw command.
- (6) Once the transfer is complete, save the file in the system's disc using the quote site savebuffer command.
- (7) Once saving is complete, disconnect using the bye command.

4.2.3 Upgrading the module

- In order for the module to update as described in the chapter on monitoring, access the PRIME interface (primeX/Y) monitoring menu.
- (2) Execute the upgrade-firmware command to start loading. If you have not preloaded the upgrade file in the system's disc, you will receive an error message.

Chapter 5 Examples

5.1 PRIME basic with Sniffer enabled

In this example, a basic configuration example for a PRIME Gateway associated with the Sniffer feature is shown. This example shows a configuration for devices that support the PRIME interface, as used typically in utilities.

The following configuration elements are set:

- (1) Cellular interface connection, through a "direct-ip" interface.
- (2) Ethernet connection.
- (3) IP basic routing for access through cellular interface.
- (4) The PRIME interface configuration (including configuration to access Sniffer data through an incoming TCP session, launched from an external application). The topology files sent through the FTP feature are included too.
 - · Base Node Mode.
 - · PLC signal enabled.
 - · Configuration to access Sniffer data through an incoming TCP session, launched from an external application
 - Topology files sent through the FTP feature.
 - · PHY layer extension.

Chapter 6 Annex A. SNMP data formats

Several commands can be triggered using the SNMP protocol and force the Gateway to start some session transfers. This annex describes the data format for these transfers.

6.1 Sniffer format for SNMP managed TCP sessions

The PRIME Gateway may activate the sniffer protocol option through SNMP. This Sniffer data format is used for outgoing TCP sessions and for requests made through SNMP commands.

For this purpose, the following objects are available for read-write operations.

- Enable Sniffer Integer (0 or 1)
- Enable Sniffer Optional Fields Integer (0 or 1)
- Destination Address IPAddress
- Destination Port Integer32

When the PRIME Gateway receives a "1" value for the Enable Sniffer object, it activates the Sniffer option (sending every MAC PDU encapsulated in TCP to the destination address-port indicated by the corresponding objects). If the Enable Sniffer Optional Fields object is also set to 1, the information will include optional fields.

This command is compatible with an SNMP topology session, meaning both can be activated at the same time. Both share the destination Address and Port.

The protocol used to transmit the sniffed traffic is a custom simple binary protocol encoded in Big Endian. The protocol encapsulates messages that have a fixed message format. The header is shared with the Topology protocol. The basic message has the following format:

Chapter 7 Annex B. Topology file

The PRIME Gateway can collect, in real time, topological data belonging to the PRIME network associated with the Base Node. This information is stored in files that can be sent to a server via FTP. These files contain the changes in state of the Service Nodes that are part of the PLC network.

This annex shows the format used to store topological events in the file.

7.1 File format

The topology event file is made up of a text file that includes several fields separated by semicolons.

The following fields shall be listed in order:

- (a) Date and Time: yyyy/mm/dd hh:mm:ss (note there is a blank space between date and time)
- (b) Semicolon
- (c) MAC address of Service Node
- (d) Semicolon
- (e) MAC address of Father Node (Switch or Base Node)
- (f) Semicolon
- (g) State of Service Node (disconnected, terminal or switch)
- (h) Semicolon
- (i) Connection quality (i.e., the percentage of success in keeping alive messages for the Service Node).
- (j) Semicolon
- (k) MAC address of the Base Node to which the Service Node is connected.
